Gathering prayer - David Poultney, Methodist Church Faith and Order

We are gathered here in grief, shock, sorrow, shame and anger. Especially for our Churches and their institutions, parishes, synods and presbyteries, schools, programmes that were run for the welfare of children. All should have been safe welcoming places, but they were not.

Behind our walls, covered by our good name the most terrible breaches of trust have happened.

Where children and young people should have felt safe

and confident in giving their trust, it has been abused.

Where children and young people have suffered, and the suffering continues. Survivors of abuse continue to carry the pain.

We acknowledge a truth we perhaps distanced ourselves from, played down, minimised.

We must now face it, to acknowledge the truth of it,

to lament it, and to pray for those who suffered and continue to suffer.

We are a people who follow Jesus, who see in him

the life of the Sacred and the possibility of a flourishing humanity.

Sometimes we forget or skim over how he suffered.

For here was a man who despite the cultural and religious prohibitions of his people was stripped before a cohort of troops. He was exposed, mocked, humiliated, beaten, and broken, was naked and put to death.

We are moved by his suffering and find our compassion deepened by it. So may we now show compassion to the victims of abuse in our churches.

May we lament their suffering and that it happened in our parishes, synods and presbyteries, our care institutions, schools and the programmes we ran for children.

So be it, Amen.

You are now invited to come forward and light a candle to recognise and affirm the victims of abuse, and for the churches as they come to terms with their involvement in abuse.

Holy God, this day we pause and we reflect. We are deeply saddened at what has occurred in the life of our nation and our national churches.

Saddened and distressed that vulnerable people have been hurt.

Hurt in situations and places where they should have been safe.

We think of Jesus who came so that all may have fullness of life .

And acknowledge that (instead) in our churches some have been denied that.

We think of the courage it would have taken for people to tell their stories.

And the pain and distress that would be there in the telling, and the hearing.

As a church we grieve for the wounds people have to bear.

And regret that this has happened within our church communities.

Through time and space the church has failed to protect vulnerable people, and given a safe haven to those in power.

And that weighs heavily on us all here and now.

Our human condition is frail and has its shadow side . And often we find that hard to admit to

ourselves and hard to bear in others God what are we to do?

We call out to you in sincere humility and deep need. (Pause in silence....).

We give thanks that this darkness can be brought to the light of Christ.

And in that light, we pray that there may be healing and justice.

In the light we pray that we can all learn from the mistakes of the past.

And ensure that the present and future is guided by your Holy Spirit.

So that all may feel safe and protected.

That integrity, justice and honesty be hallmarks of our church.

We pray that we can hold the tension of the reality of life and the hope that comes in Christ.

And that in all things you are at work - in the brokenness, in the pain, in the healing.

Gracious God, enfold your broken church in your loving embrace.

And enable us to be the people that you call us to be. Amen.
