This Christmas I would like to give thanks for writers, hymn-writers and poets who help us of celebrate this enearing season in the church calendar. I have chosen to highlight Eileen Duggan because, despite her achievements and popularity, she is largely unknown in the 21st Century. Eileen worked hard to contextualise her faith and her poetry, just as we do. Her Christmas Poem is a gift to the Churches of Aotearoa New Zealand. At one time, Marlborough-born poet, Eileen Duggan, was one of New Zealand's most widely acclaimed poets.

Between 1922 and 1951, she published five volumes of poetry, with second editions of Poems printed in England and the United States. She was made an OBE in 1937 and an honorary fellow of the Royal Society of Literature in 1943

Poetry, essays and journalism earned Duggan an income for nearly 50 years and her work was very popular. She used traditional poetic forms and simple lyrics, and Christian beliefs, legends and symbols were important elements in her work. However her poetry is now largely out of print.

Response of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand to the Royal Commission of Inquiry's findings into Abuse in Care

The Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand (The Church) accepts the findings of the Royal Commission, including our reluctance to confront abuse, failure to remove people, and the lack of consistent policies and procedures to prevent and report abuse.

The Church acknowledges and deeply regrets the abuse and neglect that occurred within its care. The Church accepts responsibility for the historical, societal, and institutional factors that contributed to these abuses. This includes the misuse of religious power, sexism, racism, and other negative attitudes that allowed such abuses to occur. We were an integral part of the social structures that caused harm. We did not use our power to stand with and advocate for the vulnerable and marginalised.

We acknowledge the physical, sexual, emotional, mental, spiritual, relational, cultural, educational, and financial effects that the victims and survivors experiencedon every part of their lives.

The cumulative harm and deep intergenerational impact on victims, survivors and their whanau are immeasurable and unacceptable. We are dedicated to improving this now and for the future.

Our Pathway Forward

Our work on the Commission's recommendations has already begun. We are committed to seeing that work through and expect to be held accountable for this commitment. In the meantime, however, we grieve deeply for all who have been harmed by our actions and inaction and provide this apology as a first step in doing the work of repentance, and from which we hope that in time, restoration may come

Proposed Treaty Principles Bill

With our Partner Churches, Kapiti Uniting Parish affirms its unwavering commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi, which commitment is embedded in the mission statements of our partner churches - and which we regard as a sacred covenant,. As a bicultural church rooted in the principles of Te Tiriti, we are profoundly concerned about the implications of the Treaty Principles Bill currently before Parliament.

With our partner churches, we oppose any legislative attempt to dilute or diminish the status of Te Tiriti o Waitangi or to undermine the principles that have been established through hard-won progress..

We recognise Te Tiriti as a covenant between tangata whenua and tauiwi, grounded in a theological understanding of covenantal partnership.

For Kapit Uniting Parish, this sacred covenant calls us to be a prophetic voice for justice and truth. Our bicultural journey is a spiritual commitment to power-sharing and mutual respect, one that reflects our belief in the transforming love of God for all people.
